Policy Intention

Finch Nest Preschool are committed to children's welfare and safety including maintaining OFSTED ratios and safeguarding children.

- Employees are safeguarded by lone working risk assessments and policies
- Employees are trained in safe lone working practices and are monitored by managers
- Lone building working is defined as one practitioner with children on their own in the building. Lone building working is not permitted under any circumstance due to safeguarding requirements.
- Lone room working is defined as one practitioner with a group of children in ratio within a play room with other staff members in the building to support if needed. Practitioners may work in the rooms on their own with children within ratio for short periods of time provided they hold the following;
 - Full DBS check
 - A valid Paediatric first aid qualification (12-hour course)
 - A valid level 2 or above safeguarding qualification
 - Are 18 years of age or over
 - Practitioners are always within close proximity to other staff in order to be able to call for assistance at any time
- Children under two are in the baby room during the day, but may join the older children during breakfast club and after school club, but always within the correct ratio
- Children over two years old are allowed to be in the upstairs room under close supervision of a practitioner within the correct ratio
- Rooms are fully equipped with a first aid kit when practitioners need to lone room work
- Practitioners are not able to lone room work in the following incidences:
 - The practitioner has a medical condition that may inhibit their ability to lone work
 - The parent has expressed in the child's registration form that they do not wish for their child to be left in sole care of one key worker
- If children are sleeping, a practitioner is to sit with them whilst they get to sleep and then to carry out 10 minute sleep checks

Parent Handover	Children Risk: Children left unsupervised when key worker is talking to parent	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ◆ Parent asked to wait for handover until another key worker is present to supervise the children ◆ Radio carried on the person at all times to call for support from another practitioner 	MED	<input type="checkbox"/> Not considered necessary	
6.	Toileting/changing	Lone worker Risk: Left with children unsupervised potential for allegations of abuse Children Risk: Potential risk of harm/abuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ◆ When lone working if key worker needs to change a nappy or toilet children on potties you will need to call for another key person to be present whilst changing ◆ Radio carried on the person at all times ◆ When toileting children in the toilet area key workers will leave the main toilet door open and never shut and lock the door with children alone 	LOW	<input type="checkbox"/> Not considered necessary
